## P.E Corby Athletics

On Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> May KC took a team of 27 Athletes to the Northampton District Athletics competition at Corby Athletics stadium. Students were able to take part in a maximum of 2 events and a relay, with many of the team taking part in a track and field event.

Overall, the Junior girls (year 8 & 9) placed 6<sup>th</sup>, Junior boys placed 7<sup>th</sup>, Inter girls (year 10 & 11) placed 7<sup>th</sup> and inter boys placed 7<sup>th</sup>. Stand out performance came from Alexis Brown (year 8) who won the Junior girls 100m in 12.39 seconds. Alexis was also part of the successful 4 x 100m relay team who took first place. The team included Madeline Agyeman, Anastecia Yeboah and Aimee East. Dave Martin Anuebunwa (year 8) won the Junior boys shot putt with a distance of 9.82m. Max Goodacre (year 10) stormed down the home straight to take victory in the inter boys 400m in a time of 55.21 seconds.

All the winners will go on to represent at the county athletics championship later in the season.







# <u>Geography</u> <u>Carding Mill Valley Fieldwork</u>

Our Year 10 Geographers had a change in pace and scenery, when we visited the Shropshire countryside and Carding Mill Valley to complete our fieldwork that supports Paper 3 of their final exams in 12 months time.

As part of their GCSE curriculum the geographers have to experience fieldwork, specifically data collection on two sites, this month has seen the exploration of the exam board theme of flows and cycles.

To investigate the characteristics of a river, students took a day trip to visit the Ash Brook at the national trust visitor centre, in the Carding Mill Valley, Shropshire - the aims of the day were to collect primary data to test the hypothesis that particle size in the river gets smaller and the speed of the river changes as you move downstream of the river.

Students collected their primary data using a range of techniques, from field sketches to river width, depth and gradient measurements.

Students also benefited from seeing how tourism in a rural area operates first hand, as well as an introduction from the National Trust team outlining their protective work of the unique environment and wildlife within it.













#### Visual Arts

It's been a very productive term with year 11 sitting their exams for their externally set task, which is the last piece of work students have to submit, marking the end of the visual arts GCSEs.

In other areas:

Year 8 have been designing and making clay tiles inspired by the artist Hundertwasser.

In fine art, year 10 have been working on their portfolio component by completing Franciose Neilly inspired tonal studies in pastel and acrylic paint

Aptitude students have been using hand building techniques to create fruit from that look like it's from another planet.

Painting in year 9 has continued with students taking photographic portraits using studio lighting then experimenting with the WPAP techniques to draw and paint them.

It's been a very exciting term within the visual arts and we look forward to celebrating the success of our students as they progress onto the next stage of their educational journey.













#### M.F.L

On Thursday 15th and Friday 16th May, 7gGe1 took part in 'Projekt Zoo' or 'Project Zoo' in our German lessons. During these lessons, Mrs Barr first taught us the German words for animals you would commonly see in a zoo. Then, we had to pick an animal to represent. Options included:

Lion, tiger, leopard, panda, polar bear, elephant, rhino, hippo, black bear, meerkat, zebra, giraffe, koala bear, orangutan, gorilla, flamingo, penguin, parrot, snake, lizard, sea turtle, frog, shark, clownfish, butterfly and owl.

When we picked our animals, we then had to make a fact file about the animal, and a mask of said animal. The fact file included: which animal we are; what biome that animal lived in; the colour(s) of the animals; whether they are a carnivore, herbivore or omnivore; and our animal's favourite activity! We had to practise this as a speech too. Lastly, we separated throughout the classroom into our different biomes, and gave our speeches at our according time (yes, we were timed!) at the imaginary zoo. Before that, we took a big photo of the animals together, wearing our animal masks!


